Christmas Homily 2016

On Christmas Eve, 1968, the crew of Apollo 8 spacecraft were orbiting 250,000 miles above the earth. In honor of the auspicious occasion of celebrating the birth of Christ they decided to read from the book of Genesis. Looking down on our tiny planet they read, "In the beginning, God made the heavens and the earth. This powerful truth was broadcast live over all the earth. God is creator of all life. Even back then, NASA was sued by atheists for allowing such a thing. They would have gone absolutely ballistic if they had known that just a few months later, Buzz Aldrin took Holy Communion with him to the moon and partook of it in the lunar modular while he read Sacred Scripture, "I am the vine you are the branches, whoever abides in me will bring forth much fruit."

Tonight we are able to broadcast loud and clear the Christmas message of Hope, Today in the city of David a Savior has been born for you, who is Christ the Lord". The great gift of Christmas. Every prayer that we offer, every loving action in which we partake enables the light of Christ to burn more brightly in our lives and in the lives of those we touch.

The great Italian poet, Dante said that Christ is "Love that moves the Sun and other stars". Our American astronauts had a unique vision of this spectacular Creation. Like them we have God's Word, Jesus Christ, who is the Word become flesh and has made his dwelling among us. Now my brothers and sisters in Christ it is up to us to move the heavens and the earth by allowing Christ to reign over us and permit our bodies to be His dwelling place. My Christmas prayer for you is that the peace, joy and love the infant babe of Bethlehem brings will enable you to continually grow in his image. That he will strengthen you in your resolve to live as his son or daughter. That he will imbue with the wisdom to make right decisions and that you will have the courage to act upon your convictions.
